1. What impacted you most from Sunday's sermon?

The ancient catacombs of Rome have many very tiny graves with the epitaph "adopted daughter of..." or "adopted son of..." inscribed on them. The 2nd Century historian Tertullian wrote that these inscriptions refer to the many babies and young children whom Christians rescued from the rubbish dumps and raised them as their own or tended to them before they died or gave them a decent burial.
