- 4. With reference to v1, in what sense are these gentile Christians, scattered across Turkey, like the Old Testament 'exiles' (read also Hebrews 11.13-16)?
- 5. In v 2, how are each member of the Trinity involved in the lives of these 'exiles'?
- 6. Referring to v3-4, why is God's mercy the starting point for our new relationship with God?

"Other hopes fade like withering flowers. The hopes of the rich, the boasts of the proud, all these will die out as a candle when it flickers in the socket. There is no unwaning hope beneath the changeful moon: the only imperishable hope is that which climbs above the stars and fixes itself upon the throne of God and the person of Jesus Christ." 7. Why is the Christian hope a 'Living hope'?

Peter knows that the pressure on these Christians to be just like the world around them is great (as it is for us). He also knows that some of these Christians are suffering for their faith. With this in mind, his pastoral priority is to help them to reflect on their identity as God's Children: chosen by the Father; indwelt and sanctified by the Spirit; made righteous by the death and resurrection of the Son; given a new birth into a living hope for life and eternity; and guaranteed a future inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade with God in the new creation.

This is the glorious reality for every child of God – scattered all over Turkey (and all over the world today)
